foxhunt. That was a really fun day.

Ed (WBØVHF) agreed with me that this will be a fun educational activity for Field Day. Since no license is required to build an antenna or to receive a radio signal, we invite people of all ages (licensed or not) to participate. I priced my antenna parts new at Menards and Radio city for \$30.11, but before you buy yours you may want to check if you already have some of what you need (see below). If you don't have a full junk box, other members are planning to share parts from theirs. I will have the basic tools needed available for you to use, but you may want to bring your own solder gun and safety glasses. I will have some extra electrical power available for your solder gun if you need it.

Now that I've built a few of these I think every licensed ham should have one of these sitting next to their go kit. They are good for Direction Finding, Emergency Communications, Skywarn, or anytime you think you might need a lightweight antenna with some forward gain to get a better signal in the direction you want.

Saturday afternoon at 1:00 we'll show you how they are built and help you build your very own 2-meter, 3-element tape-measure yagi antenna. If you're not in a building mood, we'll have a few already built.

Then we'll see how skilled you are at locating a hidden transmitter, weather permitting :-).

There will be plenty of help building and hunting—no experience or license is required.

If you find any of these parts at a better price please let me know so I can pass the word along. I am looking forward to Field Day and hope you will join us.

Suggested Parts

1 tape-measure 1 inch wide at least 10 feet long. Menards has a 25 footer sku 2433507 for \$5.96

3 feet of 1/2" schedule 40 pvc pipe. Menards 5' sku 6898504 for \$1.11

2 each of 1/2" non-threaded end caps for schedule 40 pvc. These are optional. You can use tape to cover the ends if you prefer. Menards sku 6896674 \$0.24 each

3 schedule 40 1/2" cross tees. Menards sku 6897204 \$1.06 each

6 stainless steel hose clamps 7/8 to 1 1/4. Menards 1/4 - 1 1/4 sku 6790616 50.98 each

5" of #14 or#12 solid (non stranded) wire. I have a piece you can have if you promise me you will introduce someone new to amateur radio by Field Day next year.

5' of 50ohm RG-58 cable or whatever you happen to have around the shack with a pl-259 attached to 1 end. Radio City has a nice 8' patch cable sku 15547 for \$8.50. Or you can get the longer one cut it in half and share. You can save some money if you want to solder your own pl-259 to the coax you may already have.

Bring your Handi-Talkie and whatever adapter you need to attach your HT to the pl-259. The most common is the sma adapter.

Radio city has 2 varieties. The adapter without the wire sku 13627 (or sku 13628 for Baofeng or Woxun) is \$4.50 or \$5.00.

The ones with the wire attached are more expensive ranging \$14.95 to \$17.95. Sku 15649 \$14.95 18" wire. Sku 16825 39" wire. Sku 18825 Baofeng / Wouxun reverse threading \$15.95.

The adapter without the wire is more durable and what I prefer but you decide which you like best.

Membership Meeting May 1, 2015

UST Radio Club: Tom Sturm (NØBGO) called the meeting to order at 7:30PM. He talked about the UST remote operation plans, and will meet with the UST Astronomy Department to see how they run their telescope equipment remotely (from off campus). He also mentioned a student Engineering Project which had asked about using the UST station call sign and using amateur radio frequencies to transmit data and video from a project vehicle. They now know that they need a licensed operator present to act as the station control, and they may not have enough time to get a student properly licensed before the term ended, so they may be asking for SPRC members to help them by acting as station controls.

SPRC general meeting: George Power (KØGCP) called the meeting to order at 7:40PM, and we started with a round of self introductions. Attending tonight we had 35 members, 2 guests and 1 presenter.

Secretary's Report: The General and Board meeting minutes for April were accepted as posted in the Ground Wave.

Treasurer's Report: Allan Klein (WØNLY) reported (via email) that the only income was new membership, and the only expense was for the digital voice recorder. We remain solvent. Our anticipated expenses included Field Day costs and a new or-

der of mugs.

Committee Reports:

Membership: Dale Maroushek (NØPEY) had the 2015-2016 club application forms available and reports that he has already receive five paid applications for the new year.

Circuit Builders: Orcy Lyle (WØQT) said that the CB would be available for the rest of May, but meeting during the summer might be possible by contacting her in advance (assuming that she has building access during the summer). Current projects include Arduino building.

VE Exams: Leon Dill (WØCOE) said the next exam will be May 2nd (tomorrow) and he has several candidates signed up.

Old Business:

Dale Maroushek (NØPEY) is still looking for more info on when the club started sending the auction profits to the ARRL Spectrum Defense Fund. Please feed your knowledge to Dale.

Field Day – Ed Jacobson (WBØVHF) has agreed to be FD Chair. He reported that the major chair positions have been filled, but that we need operators to fill the time slots.

New Business:

Terry Londroche (NØGOI) attended the Spring meeting of the MN Repeater Council as our club representative. He reports that the council reviewed the status of some inactive repeaters and worked on frequency allocations for some new applicants. They are also working on a coordina-

tion plan with the repeater councils of the Dakotas, lowa and Wisconsin to resolve frequency conflicts near our borders.

Election of two At-Large Board members. Candidates: Orcy Lyle (WØQT) was re-elected for another term, and Mike Thompson (AEØMT) was elected for his first term. Congratulations to both members.

Terry Londroche (NØGOI) reported that the club repeater (145.310) has been having noise problems, and he requested that anyone listening to the repeater to check the input frequencies to help him identify what is causing the noise (if they can). He also reminded members that the MAGIC yard sale has changed locations this year (see the MAGIC web page for details – www.magicrepeater.net).

John Faughn (KDØCAC) reports that the collection of "really good stuff" for the club raffles has been used up, and he is looking for suggestions on what members would like to see at the raffle.

George adjourned the meeting at 7:55PM, and after the break, introduced our program speaker Lyle Koehler (KØLR). Lyle's program included a brief history review of Software Defined Radio, and then a demonstration of an inexpensive (\$15) RTL-SDR dongle which turns your computer into a receiver with many options.

The evening concluded with our usual raffle and a reminder to contact Ed Jacobson (WBØVHF) to sign up for a timeslot at Field Day.
