Winter is definitely in full force cold wise. One of the only things to look forward to are the upcoming ham fests. Alas, the "no new projects moratorium" I have placed on myself is going to preclude me from attending. I have too many projects left to complete and I do not need my Hobby ADHD triggered by interesting stuff at these events!! Although, a friend has asked me to capture and design a circuit board for the ZM-5 QRP antenna matcher. SO....LOL. Anyway, when I send off for the boards, I will probably have a few extra made if any of you are interested. It looks to be fairly straight forward project (For later) and only has on large torrid that will need winding. So it will be an easy first project for those interested. More on this in the future. Speaking of building, a fellow ham I talked to during the Hobby ADHD net said he will be renting a heated garage starting later this year. Once he has the space, he is willing to open it up for a builders group to get together and do some soldering. That being said, it is kept at about 50 degrees in the winter (that's 60 degrees warmer than today's temperature...HI HI) so we may be able to meet all winter! (Just wear a sweater of sweatshirt) The garage is located in Rogers, MN so its not too bad of a drive. If you have a location that is closer or more centrally located, please let me know. We may yet get to have a builders group and a place to meet in the future!! I am guite excited! This is still in the works so again more to come on this as well.

The memory keyer is calling to me and I am hoping to get back to that shortly. I'm still mulling over how to get it programmed. I think I just need a day or two of quality time and it will be functional. Now if I could only find the time.

I have been using the CW Morse Ninja web site to practice my decoding off Morse Code. I am up to 20\22 WPM and 4x Farnsworth and I am seeing marked improvement in my ability to decode words up to 6 characters long. Next is to shorten the Farnsworth to 3x and then to 2x. I have been putting in around 30 minutes each day, usually as I eat lunch. There is hope!!

I have been listening more than transmitting on the bands lately (Mostly CW) and I am finding that I am picking up more and more letters and words as they are being sent. This is very encouraging and I am truly hoping to actually activate at least one park this summer. Oh, that reminds we I need to get my POTA box organized and ready as well. (Crap yet another project that I can not start yet.) Luckily, I am still making good headway on all my existing projects so maybe I will be able to address this before it gets warm.

Well, ADHD just hit this morning. I just received my QRP Quarterly and there is a picture of a multi band end fed portable antenna sold by QRP Guys... The cool part is that the circuit board is also the reel for the antenna wire and CO-AX check it out. I think this might be a fun project to build... I also think I can probably capture the schematic and again produce my boards. Although it may just be easier too buy it and build the kit... Next year that is. I guess what I need to do or I am trying to do is gather a set of boards\kits that club members would be able to build. They would range from easy to not so easy and be available to club members. Its just a thought at this point and I still have too many other things that will need my attention first. But it is a thought!! Any interest? Speaking of future projects, I announced on the Hobby ADHD net that I would like to try and get a stick and tissue model plane building group started. These would be small planes (13" to 24" wing span and rubber powered) that do actually fly and will have a low cost of entry into the hobby. Basically you will need a kit, hobby knife, a bottle of wood glue a 1' x 2' piece of soft plywood, some wax paper, T-pins and some and some sand paper. Since these would only require a 1' by 2' building area they would not take up a lot of space when building. Relive your childhood and give it a try. Interested? In the miscellaneous part of my hobbies, I have finally completed (Maybe) the Johnny Astro! It even works (well mostly) I think I may have to redesign the fan shroud to be larger as it does not seem to work as well as I remember the original unit working. It looks like I need a larger column of air. It does not have to blow any harder, I just need more air passing by the balloon to get a better "hold" on the balloon so it stays suspended in the air flow when brought to a more horizontal position. Or maybe a lighter balloon? More experimentation is needed. But for now it does work! I just put the final coat of paint on the small glider project I've been working on. I have installed the electronics and motor and I have it balanced at the recommended center of gravity. Once the weather warms up a bit, I will give it it's maiden flight somewhere near to my house. Its small enough that it will be flyable in about a 3 acre open plot of land.

I now have most of the components needed to build the smoke enclosure for the updated laser. I even bought a new chop saw blade for cutting the aluminum extrusions. (Very Scary) I also designed and printed fixtures for using 3/4" PVC pipe to make adjustable hangers that will attach to the ceiling joists in my shack so I can open up additional floor space for other stuff. Of course when I went to the building supply store to get the pipe, I forgot to get the right angle elbows that I needed. It's hell getting old... LOL. I have two more planes that are almost ready for primer and paint. Since the glider is done and the DH 108 and the Baby birdie are ready for paint\primer, I have begun restoring a classic R/C glider. It's called a Sagitta 900. It has about a 90" wingspan and was very popular about 40 years ago. I inherited it from a fellow that can no longer fly and I promised him that I would get it back into the air. This is a bit different as it does not have a motor to pull it up to altitude, it will require being towed up by another model plane to altitude via a tow line. Once it is up to altitude, I release it from the tow line and glide around and hunting for thermals. It needs a bit of TLC and repairs before it is air worthy so it will be a bit of an undertaking on my part.

Well that's about it for now. Pretty much the same stuff as always I hope you find it at least somewhat interesting and hopefully I have given you some ideas and triggered your hobby ADHD. Do contact me if any of this interests you and you want to try any of it.





Monitoring AM Radio by Scott Holisky NØAR

One of my favorite things about winter time radio is visiting the AM broadcast band. Tonight we are expected to have rain showers and of course our friends lightning and static. The nice quiet conditions we have had on 160 and 80 meters will soon be a memory. Now is the time to get in an evening of low band use without the noise.

Most of our modern ham HF radios have AM broadcast band coverage and even below. If your HF antenna works there you're all set to begin. If not you have a project to make something that will work! A smaller loop or even a short wire tossed in a tree is all you need to start with. If you don't have a receive only antenna you really need to look into it. Something that you can use that has a lower noise than your main antenna can be very useful. This is why a lot of HF radios have a receive antenna input and selection. Quick side track: My 43 foot vertical with remote tuner and a good radial field is a great antenna for transmitting. It barks. On receive I can hear every wall-wart for a mile around, it is the worst thing imaginable. The trick is to use a separate antenna to listen with.

Broadcast band monitoring need not be just a night time adventure. There are plenty of low power stations that serve their local communities. Many are strong enough that they can be heard all day long.

Looking for those nighttime Clear Channel or daytime local stations, they are just a Google search away! There are frequency lists and predicted antenna plots for most stations. Almost all stations have an internet presence so that's worth checking as well.

I once heard of an a guy that wanted to listen to our neighbor to the North streaming audio. Seems they didn't allow this and blocked IP addresses to the South. Wouldn't you know he found a VPN putting him in their country would fake that restriction... It's just what I heard he did. So don't give up if the weather closes in on you and the static chases you away.



Amateur Radio Emergency Preparedness Act Re-Introduced

Legislation Will Increase Communication Options During Natural Disasters

WASHINGTON – U.S. Senators Roger Wicker, R-Miss., and Richard Blumenthal, D-Conn., and Representatives August Pfluger, R-Tex., and Joe Courtney, D-Conn. announced their joint re-introduction of legislation in the Senate and House to restore the right to Amateur Radio operators to install the antennas necessary to serve their communities.

Homeowner association rules often prevent Amateur Radio operators from installing antennas at their homes even though Amateur Radio has proven to be essential in emergencies and natural disasters such as hurricanes when other means of communication fail.

"Mississippians should have access to every possible means of warning for natural disasters, including amateur radio operators. In an emergency, those warnings can mean the difference between life and death," Senator Wicker said. "The Amateur Radio Emergency Preparedness Act would remove unnecessary roadblocks that could help keep communiques safe during emergencies like tornadoes, hurricanes, and fires."

"When disaster strikes, amateur radio operators provide vital, often life-saving information, which shouldn't be hindered by prohibitive rules or confusing approval processes. The Amateur Radio Emergency Preparedness Act eliminates obstacles for ham radio enthusiasts, allowing them to continue their communication and serve their communities in the face of emergencies," said Senator Blumenthal.

"Natural disasters and other emergency situations that hinder our regular lines of communication are unfortunately unavoidable, which is why we must bolster our emergency preparedness by removing the barriers amateur radio operators often run into when installing antennas. Amateur radio plays a vital role in public safety by delivering critical information to people at all times. My district is home to dozens of amateur radio operators ready to volunteer in the event of an emergency, and I am proud to lead this legislation," said Congressman August Pfluger.

"As we know from recent natural disasters, amateur radio operators in Connecticut can be a critical component of disaster response and emergency management. It is in our communities best interest that we give them the capabilities to operate at the highest level, and with the re-introduction of this bill, we've taken a strong step in that direction," said Congressman Courtney.

Background:

The Amateur Radio Emergency Preparedness Act of 2025 (H.R. 1094 and S. 459) would require homeowner associations to accommodate the needs of FCC-licensed Amateur Radio operators by prohibiOng the enforcement of private land use restrictions that ban, prevent, or require the approval of the installation or use of Amateur Radio station antennas. Homeowner associations have often prevented installation and use of such antennas through private land use restrictions. This has hindered voluntary training for emergency situations and blocked access to necessary communications when disaster strikes.

Among other provisions, this legislation would:

- -Prohibit homeowner association rules that would prevent or ban Amateur Radio antennas;
- -Specify an approval process for installing Amateur Radio antennas;
- -Provide a Federal private right of action to Amateur Radio operators in disputed cases.
