January is the Auction month, the 22nd is the date. But first, be sure to watch for last minute announcements caused by events that we have no control over. If Covid or variant XXX cause's mandatory closures of school, city, county, state, country or world shut down, it will disappear until a later date.

That being said, the first forty pictures of "the good or big stuff" are posted on the website under Auction, along with the flyer and rules. This site,

About 40 more may be posting as days go on, but we hope to able to show them at the meeting as a slide show with verbal explanation and questions answered from what we know. Big Thank You out to George, NOSBU, our webmaster for doing all the posting, Mark, N7LAS, and Lou, WD8NOV, for the photography.

As you can now see, there is a ton of stuff down there that needs new homes. The CDH Station will be the primary home. I'll be talking with Br. Bob about room at the new station or STEM Center to build a library with some of the books and manuals. They may want some of the hardware and electronic parts for building projects too. As we unpack some of the boxes, we expect to find more items to go into the "FREE" section, described later.

Other goodies will find their way to the Silent Auction section and be boxed in hopes that bidding wars will break out because Jim and John, who both want a special prize inside, and are willing to duel over them. Keep it in mind, that AFTER the auction, side sales are an option if you work together.

The Live Auction as we call it, will have the usual talented Auctioneers and a couple new ones. These include our friends Jay, Brian, Tom, Ralph, Dale, Ben (he has to try it) and Joe. They have been instructed and agree to pick up the pace and move through this stuff quickly.

First the begging. We control this sale via 3 computers, a couple printers, a banker, one runner and an alternate. Six people are needed just to fill the slots. I need to identify you volunteers, something I have not had to do in the past. SO, who are those that will be manning the control table?

I was happy to get all the helpers at the photo session, and we have a couple photos of most of them to show at the meeting. However, the amount of stuff down there and the job of getting it up to the sales areas Friday night will be massive. Many hands make easy work but, follow the route here as it gets complicated. First is sales room set up. Br. Bob usually has it about right, but always something to adjust. Everything is in three rooms in the Brother's basement. It needs to be picked in a "sort of order", loaded onto/into carts, moved up the elevator, out the door, around or into the garage, into the

building, into the room or the foyer, unloaded, tagged into the items list, and displayed nicely. Then the carts go back down for more, and repeat. Two easy jobs for the semi mobile will be door guys at the school and the House. We had a dozen guys at the photo shoot, 20 to 25 helpers would be better on Friday night the 21st. And you get firsthand look at all the goodies! Step up and help us out.

The rest of the plan. We haven't finalized this yet, but we may have a garage out there, for free stuff. If things work out, we plan to open the garage later, like noon, so we can get a few bucks for the stuff we displayed before you leave for home. That stuff may never make it back into inventory, for next year, and we don't want it back as a donation in the future either.

The Live and Silent auctions will run like they have in years past, only quicker. The Minimum Bid has always been a stumbling block. Let me explain. The seller thinks his item is worth XX dollars and lists it as Minimum. We open the auction item and get nothing. We ask the seller if they will lower the minimum. They agree and the minimum drops to –XX, say half price. It gets a bid, and another and the next one is right back to the original minimum bid. STOP THAT, it wastes time, just bid the minimum and let's go here! Large more expensive items are researched and listed fairly, just dive in and take it home with you.

The Silent Auction minimum bid is \$1. I shop the dollar store and buy many things. Value is in the eyes (or storage space, or XYL's look, or the challenging project for 2022) of the beholder. Go in there, be aggressive. If it looks interesting, buy it! After the auction, sell it, trade it, throw it, we don't want it either.

Like Field Day, take down is factor two of this event, and many hands will make it easier too. What we created we need to remove. Hopefully we get by with tons less than before to return to the basement. Tables and clean up always take time, usually only an hour. Leftover food is offered free first, then removed.

Ramblings from the VP's Work Bench - Kevin Welna - W5LNA

PIXIE Kits are here! If you requested one, please contact me (651.354.5515) so I can get your kit to you!

Well, it's been a busy December. Alas I have not been all that "radioactive". Between Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's preparations plus friends/family gatherings, this time of year makes it hard to do much of anything. On a more positive note (Maybe) winter has hit with a bit of a vengeance and temps are starting to fall. This is a great time to dig through your hobby stuff and pursue that which interests you while staying warm. I have been accused of having hobby ADHD as well as having the hobby of collecting hobbies..... Alas it true. What can I say, everything interests me! So, what's on the bench? Currently a stick and tissue rubber powered airplane. (Dumas Products - Mr. Mulligan) I found the kit in the basement along with lots of other neat stuff...so I decided to build it. As a kid, I built a bunch of Comet, Gillows and Sterling stick and tissue models. Almost none of them flew and being in a hurry, they were all of questionable build quality. This time I decided to do it right (more or less) and get the correct tools and take my time and not rush the process. This meant purchasing fresh X-Acto blades, single sided razor blades, T-Pins and a couple squares of 12 x 12 x 1/2"cork board and I stole the wife's roll of wax paper. I already has a bottle of Tight Bond wood glue that I could water down. All up it was about \$20. To date, all the structures are built and sanded. Next is covering the model. For this I am currently watching a few You Tube - How to Videos. Interestingly, model airplane dope is getting hard to find and I do believe that it is no longer being manufactured to prevent people from sniffing it and because of the "dangerous" chemicals used in its manufacturing... At least that's what they said at the local hobby shop. Another wonderful childhood memory/smell deleted by do-gooders.....Alas I digress...

One of the best parts of re-visiting my youth and this hobby is that I can incorporate using my 3D printer into the hobby. If I need a tool, part, clamp or whatever, I either look online and find a design or I can design one on my own and print it out.

Why not revisit your youth and build a model or whatever else you liked as a kid? Today's kits are way better than the kits of old. The parts are all laser cut. They

actually fall out of the balsa sheet! No more smashed/crushed parts that bear only mild resemblance to the drawing of the part on the plan. The cost of entry is little more than lunch at a Denny's and the pleasure/feeling of Zen you will get is priceless. It will only take up about 2-3 square feet of space. I am by no means an authority on building these types of kits, but if you decide to give it a go, I will be happy to discuss/collaborate and\or print off any part(s) or tool(s) that you may need.

With the air frames built, my workbench has opened up a bit. So now it's time to start on the PIXIE Kit along with a couple other electronics kits and experiments. I did find a good PC board clamp-vice for soldering, it's a little weak in a couple of spots but I think I can redesign it with a brass tube down through the center of the pivot ball and into the base to give it more structural integrity.

I am looking forward to learning more about how transceivers work as well reremembering my electronics schooling from 40 years back. Did I mention that I received a new digital oscilloscope from my wife for my B-Day?! I have a great wife!!! I think the O-Scope will help in this endeavor.

While all 20 Pixie kits I ordered are spoken for, you can still order one up from Pixie Kits and join us in building this little guy. You can find the kits online (China) for as little as \$5 without an enclosure. Again, it's cold out there! Here is a great way to mitigate cabin fever so why not give it a go? More to come on the Pixie in future articles.

Last time I checked, the STEM space at CDH is not yet ready for us. That being the case, I don't believe we can get together to build the Pixies. Maybe, we can at least get together to test and talk about them? Maybe we can do a net on the St. Paul repeater? Time will tell. For now, let's assume that we will have to build the kits on our own.

My second Morse Code class starts January 6 of 2022. I have been a bit lax in practicing so I will have to kick that in gear ASAP. While my recognition speed has faltered due to a lack of use, I still remember all the letters, numbers, and punctuation that I learned from the first class. So at least some of it is sticking in my brain. Truly I cannot recommend CW OPS training enough. It's free, the process works and is proven to work. It's fun and since you meet twice a week for an hour via zoom, you are motivated\held accountable to practice. It got me over my hump and back on track. I wish I would have started with them, rather than trying to learn it on my own. They got results faster and with better retention in 8 weeks than I could do in 1.5 years trying on my own.

Imagine if you will, you are sitting at your radio and listening on a cold winter night. Moonlight filtered through the clouds robs the view out your window of all color, leaving only shades of grey. The room is darkened. All you have is the glow from your dials and maybe a tube or two in the back of the radio glowing and adding a bit of extra heat and ambiance to the room. 
OK maybe it not romantic for you, but, its cold out there, why not try/learn something new and do it where you can stay warm?
